WOMEN'S WINTER REVIVAL! SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 22, 2-7 PM LIME CREEK NATURE CENTER



POP-UP SNOWSHOE HIKES LIME CREEK NATURE CENTER

Winter weather can be unpredictable but also very fun! When the snow gets deep, we can creep. Keep an eye on our Facebook and Instagram pages for these fun, "pop-up" guided winter hikes.







As fall arrives and deciduous trees shed their leaves, we can rely on conifers to give us a glimpse of green throughout winter. The Eastern white pine, one of lowa's five native evergreen species, is a popular tree for many reasons. Known for its rapid growth and long life span, this tree provides both benefits and beauty.

The Eastern white pine has bundles of five needles, each about 3-5 inches long. This tree can grow up to 80 feet tall and live up to 100 years old. Each fall, the Eastern white pine sheds its older needles, keeping only the current year's growth. This sets it apart from the other lowa evergreens, who overwinter with 2-3 years of needles.





Eastern white pines serve many important purposes, both ecologically and culturally. Many birds and small mammals benefit from the food and shelter these pines provide. Their size and extensive root system make them excellent windbreaks and help to mitigate soil erosion. Due to their beauty, Eastern white pines are popular ornamental trees in year-round landscaping. It's also common to bring them indoors during the holiday season as Christmas trees. The lumber industry favors white pines for many projects due to their soft and easily workable wood. Unlike many other woods, white pine doesn't shrink or swell significantly, which is a major advantage. These qualities make the Eastern white pine a favorite tree among many lowans.

Wilkinson Pioneer Park


Nestled in the town of Rock Falls this beautiful 80-acre park has something for everyone. Donated in 1960 by Mr. and Mrs. Rufus Wilkinson, this park contains 40 modern campsites and an enclosed shelter that can be rented for small events and gatherings.

Spanning across a small creek that empties into the river is a covered bridge that was originally built in 1969. This unique piece of history is one of only a few covered bridges that you can still drive through. Wilkinson Pioneer Park offers easy access to the beautiful Shell Rock River.
